Ford Motor Company's history of hiring workers with disabilities dates back to founder Henry Ford and the company's early years.

To mark the 30th anniversary of the Americans With Disabilities Act, we're looking back at Ford Motor Company's long history of hiring workers with disabilities dating back to company founder Henry Ford. Ford became one of the first companies to hire people with disabilities, and in the 1910s, it was said that no one applying for work at Ford was rejected due to their physical condition, according to a 1998 edition of "The Ford Legend."

By 1916, Ford employed more than 900 people with disabilities. That number would greatly increase following World War I, as Ford Motor Company began hiring disabled veterans returning from the battlefield in 1919. Less than a decade later, the company employed an estimated 13,000 people with disabilities.


Ford also adapted the workplace to meet the needs of its employees with disabilities, including providing specially modified equipment for those who had lost limbs. Similarly, blind or visually impaired employees were tasked with sorting or assembling parts by feel.

These efforts were applauded by Helen Keller, a pioneer and champion for the disabled, who wrote to Ford in 1929. In 1944, Keller gave the speech as Henry Ford was honored by the American Foundation for the Blind (Henry Ford II accepted the award in New York City, as Henry Ford was unable to travel.

"Truly the service of Ford Motor Company to the blind is unique in the annals of (the) handicapped community," Keller said, according to "The Ford Legend." "What a dream it was when your grandfather first gave voice to an enlightened attitude towards physically impaired persons who could work, and let the blind enter his great plants not out of charity but because of their productive abilities."

1977 Ford Maverick

Like the Dart, a police specification Maverick was introduced for its last year of production.

Complaints about the Maverick were so rampant Ford ceased production after making only 350 of them, leading to theories these may be the rarest Ford police cars ever. Such a Maverick sounds like this was not one of Ford's better ideas.

While its easy to find pictures of police outfitted Mavericks from all years, particularly in military use, Ford only offered them as such for one year.



James Bond's Muscle Car From 'On Her Majesty's Secret Service' Is Up for Auction By RACHEL CORMACK

The cherry-red rarity could reach \$200,000 at Bonhams's annual Bond Street sale.

From a <u>1962 Rolls-Royce Silver Cloud II</u> to his iconic <u>Aston Martin DB5</u>, <u>James Bond</u> is best known for his impossibly elegant British rides. But that doesn't mean 007 didn't occasionally deviate from the script. For the sixth film in the franchise, everybody's favorite MI6 agent starred alongside a seductively powerful <u>1969 Mercury Cougar XR-7 convertible</u>, and it's just been listed for auction.

The all-American muscle car made its screen debut in the 1969 classic *On Her Majesty's Secret Service*. This Bond flick is somewhat of an anomaly in the series. It's the only one to feature Australian actor George Lazenby as 007 and is considered by some a more realistic adaptation of Ian Fleming's 1963 novel. Serial playboy Bond actually gets married, and it's his new wife that introduces him to the jaw-dropping four-wheeler.

Contessa Teresa "Tracy" di Vicenzo, who was played by the ineffable Diana Rigg, famously helps her new hubby escape Blofeld's bullies in a nail-biting car chase. The cougar ruthlessly claws its way through the ice thanks to a 335 hp Cobra Jet 428 V8 engine that gives it the ability to zoom from zero to 60 in 5.6 seconds.

Following the film, the vintage <u>Mercury</u> went on to become a classic in high demand. For the past several decades, it's appeared as a show car and museum fixture and is particularly coveted among collectors.

While it doesn't have all the plentiful gadgets of Bond's <u>beloved DB5</u>, the beast still sports an array of special touches from the film, including a ski rack, two pairs of wooden skis and hood pins, you know, to make you feel like you're in her majesty's secret service. Not to mention the model is also in immaculate condition.

Of course, you'll likely have to shell out six figures for the rarity. The 1969 Mercury Cougar XR7 is expected to fetch between \$130,000 and \$200,000 at Bonhams's annual <u>Bond Street sale</u>. Taking place December 16, the auction also includes <u>a 1967 Ferrari 330 GTC</u> (estimate: \$620,000-\$760,000), a <u>1967 Aston Martin DB6 Vantage Volante</u> (estimate: \$720,000-\$850,000), and a <u>1953 Bentley Continental</u> (estimate: \$720,000-\$920,000).
