

Ford Plants Seeds of Truck Leadership with Model TT







The Model TT came at a time when the nation's road system was being expanded, thanks in part to the success of the Model T, and businesses were looking for heavier, stronger, and more economical vehicle options for their shipping operations. Aftermarket manufacturers had already been busy adapting the Model T – which accounted for half of all vehicles on American roads by 1917 – with truck body frames before Henry Ford seized on the newfound demand.

The Model T was Introduced during a flurry of Ford production, spurred by the United States' entry into World War I, which set records in the U.S. and Canada. The truck retained the cab and engine of its predecessor but also included a heavier-duty frame capable of carrying a payload of up to one ton. The Model TT added 2 feet to the Model T's 100-inch wheelbase and had a stiffer rear suspension. The truck also featured a more durable worm-drive rear axle already used in many aftermarket conversions, artillery-style wooden wheels and solid rubber rear tires.

The \$600 truck chassis could be customized with aftermarket beds and cargo areas, befitting the line of work where they were needed. Sales mirrored that of the Model T, as Ford sold just over 200 of the Model TTs in the first year and led all manufacturers in truck sales by the end of the 1920s. During that time, the company's truck production had grown to more than 260,000 units in 1925. Sales eventually totaled 1.3 million by 1928 when the Model TT was replaced by the Model AA, a 1.5-ton chassis.

The Model TT paved the way for Ford's first dedicated pickup, the Model T Runabout with Pickup Body, which came in 1925, and the many others that followed, including the Ford F-Series in 1948.

HENRY FORD CELEBRATES 80TH BIRTHDAY WITH U.S. NAVY



Henry Ford spent his 80th birthday with the U.S. Navy at the Rouge plant.

Ford Motor Company founder Henry Ford celebrated his 80th birthday on July 30, 1943. He spent the occasion with the U.S. Naval Training School at the Ford Rouge plant.

The day included a cake modeled after the naval school building, time spent with the trainees and teachers and Ford being gifted a military drill by the servicemen.

Two years earlier, the Naval Training School recognized Ford's patriotic contribution during World War II, which included the creation of the Naval Training School, gifting Ford a trophy for his birthday.





Looking Back at Ford's Role in NASA's Last Moon Landing

Humankind's first steps on the moon have been well-documented, but it's been a long time since an astronaut has set foot on the lunar surface. In fact, it's the 50th anniversary of that accomplishment – and Ford's former subsidiary, Philoo-Ford, helped enable Apollo 17, which NASA called "the last, longest and most successful of seven manned lunar landing missions."

Apollo 17 launched in the early morning hours of Dec. 7, 1972, with the support of Philco-Ford, which was also known as a global producer of household appliances and electronics such as TVs, radios and refrigerators. The company was NASA's prime contractor for the design, implementation and operation of the Mission Control Center in Houston beginning in the 1960s. The Ford subsidiary was also responsible for updating the facility to meet the changing requirements for each subsequent mission, which it did concurrently with Apollo 17 in preparation for the earth-oriented Skylab project that would follow the Apollo flights.

Apollo 17 astronauts Gene Cernan – the final person to step foot on the moon's surface – Ron Evans and Jack Schmitt were supported in the mission by the services, systems and products of Philco-Ford's Aerospace and Defense Systems Operations. The Ford subsidiary also provided radiation detection units for the mission. The telescope-like device, called the Nuclear Particle Detection System, measured radiation levels inside the spacecraft and reported data back to Mission Control. The cigar box-sized electronics also measured radiation from solar flares, gaseous eruptions from the sun.

The Philco-Ford-built communications and tracking technology that helped the company "maintain the fragile link between earth and spacecraft" reportedly relayed one of the most important messages of the voyage. A <u>course correction was needed to ensure the crew a proper reentry angle</u> into the earth's atmosphere upon their Dec. 19 return. A miscalculation could have been fatal.

Philco-Ford ran a full-page ad celebrating the astronauts' safe return and reminding the public that the company's work in space travel would pay off in the consumer products. Continued page 8

The company was also responsible for what viewers saw from the mission, though public interest had significantly waned since the days of Neil Armstrong, Buzz Aldrin and Apollo 11. Despite the lukewarm reception, Philco-Ford technology was involved in nearly every step of relaying TV footage from the moon to viewers' homes.

Previous Philco-Ford contributions to the Apollo missions, such as magnetometers placed on the moon's surface, continued to measure and transmit data on variances in the moon's magnetic fields long after NASA's astronauts had returned to earth. Scientists used that information to determine the internal composition and origin of the moon.

While Apollo 17 didn't get the same kind of attention as its predecessors – it might be best known for producing the <u>"Blue Marble" image of the Earth</u>. More recently, <u>NASA scientists</u> <u>unsealed a soil sample collected during the trip</u> for analysis using modern-day technology.

Philco-Ford, renamed Ford Aerospace and Communications Corporation in 1976, remained involved with Mission Control through NASA's Skylab, Apollo-Soyuz and Space Shuttle missions.

Ford Motor Company ultimately exited the aerospace industry, though, as the company focused on its automotive and finance businesses Ford Online

in 1990. NASA, meanwhile, is planning humankind's return to the moon in 2025. Last month, it launched the uncrewed Artemis I as a precursor to human exploration.

Just as an added note Buss Aldrin was married this weekend. He is 93 years old.

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
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
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
