Swap Meet Report – Lou Ironside

Three swap meets to report on this month, and two great ones out of three is a really good number. First, the Monroe Swap Meet put on by Nick Avina at the Monroe County Fairgrounds. I don't know what magic Nick has, but that meet continues to grow and grow. This fall was the largest I have ever seen there, and although the early Ford parts were definitely in short supply, everyone in our group found some parts to drag home. Lots of free parking, and a very reasonable \$6. Admission. This is one meet I definitely keep on my calendar.

The next meet was the NSRA Nationals North in Kalamazoo. This at one time was really great meet, but it has gone downhill in the last few years. I would guess the swap meet was 1/3 the size of ten years ago, there were a few good parts to be bought, but really down from years past. Last year the vehicle count was around 1400, this year I was told it was 1070, and ten years ago it was in the 2400 range! The Frankenmuth meet is often given as the reason for the decline, but personally I feel it is the costs involved. At Frankenmuth you don't need to be a member of a club, the costs are quite reasonable and even though there is no significant swap meet, it draws in 2000+ cars. Swap spaces at NSRA are small and expensive, the indoor spaces for commercial vendors have gone "through the roof" price wise, and now where in the past there were several rooms filled, now it is just a handful. And this year there were no outdoor commercial vendors where in the past there were several. If you are an NSRA member and register your car it is reasonable to get in, but the admission at the gate is quite expensive and I am sure keeps some people My personal opinion is they need to make some changes, or the Nationals North will cease to exist.

The third swap meet was at Model A Day's at the Model A Museum in the Gilmore Red Barns complex. This year the swap meet was the largest ever, and basically nothing but Model A Ford parts. Brian's Tips / 'Brake, don't Break'

Oh yeah, here I go again about brakes, because stopping seems kind of important to me. My dad once said to me, which I remember to this day, "when they don't start that's something, but when they don't stop, that's something else!" Brake fluid is hydroscopic, which means it absorbs moisture. As the brake fluid in your car absorbs moisture it lowers the boiling point, which can cause 'killer' issues. When you are repeatedly stopping on those fun summer cruises, eventually the over due to be changed fluid can begin to boil because of excessive moisture in it, which then causes compressible steam that won't perform the hydraulic work fluid is intended to do, and the vehicle won't stop. In the wintertime that fluid with too much moisture in it can freeze up, and again the car won't stop. I am sure all of us have seen cruise cars that come out of the barn only a couple times a year bang into the car in front of them, or hit a pole, or go up and over a curb, or hit a person because the car didn't stop. Besides what I just mentioned, that fluid that has not been changed will lower the vehicles' ability to function by causing corrosion in the calipers, wheel cylinders, master cylinder and brake lines, which can and does cause brake lines to rust from the inside out, and not from the outside in as most owners think. This glycol-based hydraulic brake fluid should be changed every couple of years to ensure your braking system continues to function as it was designed to function. On an everyday driver it's always a good idea to flush out and change the fluid anytime the brakes are done, but people that own specialty cars have the tendency to believe nothing wears out because, so few miles are put on their vehicles. DOT 3 and DOT 4 synthetic fluid can be used to replace the brake fluid of a car that requires the regular DOT 3 or DOT 4, and will work on disc and drum brakes, but I prefer to stick with the manufacturers recommended fluid because we know that will work for sure. For your information here, while I'm on a roll, DOT 5 is very different because it is silicone based and should never be used to replace your DOT 3 or DOT 4 fluid. Besides that, the DOT 5 will not work with antilock brakes. I've been told that DOT 5 can provide corrosion protection for vehicles in storage for long periods of time, but I don't see why I would bother with that anyways. Lastly, remember, that fluid doesn't last forever, even in the can that's being stored in, so keep the cap closed very tightly and don't be afraid to spend a few \$\$\$'s to buy good fresh brake fluid.
